Keeping Fit - Is Your Dog in Condition for Competition?

If you are thinking about or already competing with your dog, there are many factors to consider. Having your dog in optimal physical and mental condition should be at the top of the list.

Chris Zink (1992) describes the purpose of conditioning as two fold: maximizing the function of the musculature and cardiovascular systems, and improving skills and coordination in order to prevent injury. She points out that the handler's efforts to condition the dog also serve to train for specific events, develop strength and endurance, improve timing, and release endorphins. You will find that conditioning exercises improve the relationship between you and your dog by carving out a regular time in the day where intensive, one-on-one interaction occurs, and where both parties learn to 'read' and understand the other better.

Before starting any exercise

program, take a critical look at your dog. Consider his/her weight. Most athletic dogs are on the thin side compared to dogs who are showing in conformation, or who are pets. Look at his/her feet. The toenails should be kept short for safety and comfort. Finally, if your dog has any medical problems, consult with your vet before starting an exercise or agility program.

The following are ways to improve the condition of your agility dog so that he/she will be in the best shape possible when you finally are ready to go to a show.

Stretch out and cool down

Always remember to stretch your dog's muscles thoroughly before and after each workout. You can use food and a clicker to help with this, and some dogs will learn to stretch on cue. Make sure your dog's muscles are warm and limber before starting. After the workout, include a cool-down period into your routine to give

your dog's muscles a chance to get rid of any lactic acid build up, and to allow the heart and respiration rates to return to normal.

Road walking

As boring as it may sound, walking on lead is an excellent way to condition your agility dog. Walking at a brisk, even pace provides your dog with exercise that improves muscle tone and cardiovascular endurance. What seems to work best is to train your dog to 'walk on' in front of you at the end of the lead. Keep the pace as consistent as possible. You will want to 'potty' your dog before you begin your walk. Teach the dog that this is different from regular walks. This is work, and he/she is expected to trot steadily rather than sniffing and marking every telephone pole or blade of grass. Using a different lead/collar combination sometimes helps. Also verbal cues such as 'want to do some work?' and telling the dog to 'walk on'

Unfinished Business -

Constitution/Bylaws and Non-Profit -

Thalia and Martha contacted the IRS office in Kentucky regarding our non-profit classification. They explained we do education, rescue, hold dog shows, grocery certificates, etc. The IRS agent felt we should apply for a 501(c)(3) – total non-profit. She stated that 501(c)(3) is the "better" classification because donations are tax deductible and if the agent who reviews your application determines you do not qualify for that classification he will indicate the classification we do fall under. In that case, you are only paying the \$500

filing fee. If you apply directly for 501(c) (7), pay the \$500 filing fee, and are accepted under that classification and decide to switch to the 501(c)(3) then you will incur an additional \$500 fee. The paperwork for 501(c)(3) is very tedious and we were previously advised by Richard Clark (tax attorney) that this is not a direction we would probably want to go. The IRS agent did not think the agility trial, etc. would be a problem with any classification. The IRS agent generalized that all methods which raise funds for the club, whether it's straight donations, agility trial, grocery certificates, as a means to support our overall tax exempt purpose would not be a problem. She stated that all tax exempt organizations have costs.

- A major portion of filing for non-profit status is to get our bylaws and constitution in line with the clubs current activities. In addition, we have been advised to update these by Richard Clark, for potential liability issues. Thalia and Martha provided the board with a draft of new bylaws. They began with the AKC's sample bylaws and then included the IRS guidelines. A change to the bylaws requires 2/3 voting. There will be a meeting of all interested parties to discuss the bylaws at Thalia Peletis's home on Tuesday, July 29 at 7:00 pm.
- We will contact other clubs, Buckeye Kennel Club (currently a 501(c)(3)), CPA's, etc. to determine the pro's and con's of how they have organized themselves (for IRS purposes). This may help us determine if non-profit is appropriate for DSA.

Rescue Committee Pet Store Policy -

The following was approved by the board to be included in the DSR committee guidelines:

DSR Pet Store Policy

DSR does not seek out Samoyeds in pet-store, puppy-mill, or auction situations or those offered for sale by individual back-yard breeders, etc. However, if a case is reported where the Samoyed will be euthanized, or where the living conditions are considered to be a risk to the health and welfare of the animal, then the Samoyed may be eligible for rescue services upon the approval of the DSR committee. The procedure to assess the situation will be as follows:

- A minimum of two different people will visit the facility on two separate occasions.
 One individual will be a DSR committee member and the other someone who is familiar with the Samoyed breed.
- During those visits we will attempt to obtain the following information: age, health and vaccination history, spayed/neutered status, pedigree information, and selling price, etc.
- If it is determined that the animal's wellbeing is in jeopardy then the DSR committee will decide what action to take. Re-

gardless of DSR's decision, we will still report the facility to the appropriate state agencies.

4. If DSR decides to purchase the puppy and the negotiated purchase price exceeds the committee's spending limit, as set forth by the DSA board, then the committee will make a good-faith attempt to contact the Board for approval based on any time constraints that may impact the survival of the dog.

If an individual contacts DSR soliciting an opinion or information about purchasing a Samoyed from a pet store or other pet facility, DSR will use the opportunity to provide educational information about responsible breeding and encourage the person to contact DSA Breeder Referral

ing and the proposed slate needs to be sent to the Corresponding Secretary before the September meeting.

It was **motioned** and **approved** to increase spending limits of committees as follows:

 Given our current club's assets (~\$5K – General/ ~\$17K – Rescue), our ability to raise funds fairly readily, and inflation, the following motion was approved by the board:

To modify the committee spending limit guidelines as follows:

The maximum spending limit allowed without board approval is:

- 1) Local Specialty and rescue committees increase limit to \$1000
- 2) Ways & Means committee Grocery Certificate purchases only increase limit to \$3000.
- 3) All other committees remain at \$200 limit.

As long as the expense does not cause the overall:

General fund bank balance plus grocery certificate balance to fall below \$750. Rescue fund bank balance to fall below \$5000.

If the club's asset's decrease drastically and/or our ability to raise funds is reduced, then the spending limits will be reviewed by the board and adjusted accordingly.

Debbie Castro attended the Games Manager recertification course on Saturday, July 19th. Once she receives confirmation that she passed the test we can resume having raffles. The requirement is that the Games Manager is recertified every 4 years and there is a \$10 fee. This is a new requirement by the state as of 2002.

Motion to pay for Heartworm Treatment for Ice

It was **motioned** and **approved** to pay \$500 for the heartworm treatment for Ice (now Jester) a rescue dog that was recently placed. He is 18 months old and both our vet and the adoptive families vet consider him an excellent candidate for the treatment. He is not showing any clinical signs of the disease.

Meeting adjourned at 9:50 pm



when out there. Chris Zink uses a wooden dowel to keep her dogs trotting in front of her. Walks should vary in length and intensity, and handlers should watch carefully for signs of fatigue or over heating.

Swimming

If your dog likes to swim, this is a wonderful way to provide a low impact, but very intensive, workout. Like walking on lead, taking your dog swimming as a conditioning exercise is different than taking your dog out for a play swim. First, you need to find a pool, pond or lake that is clean and free of hazards such as broken glass, etc. that both of you can wade in. Next, you need a basic nylon dog harness and a Flexi retractable lead. With your dog on lead, wade into the water until the dog is slightly beyond his/her depth. Of course, if you have a giant breed, this may not be possible, but this is still a good workout. Start walking slowly, parallel to the shore, offering your swimming

dog quiet words of encouragement: good dog, great job. Observe your dog very carefully. They get pretty tired quickly. Swim your dog for short periods of time with frequent rest and play breaks. Use reasonable caution in very cold or rough water, and don't allow the dog to get chilled after a workout.

Runs in the woods

This activity is fun for both you and your dog, and something that you might already be doing. It is a less effective aerobic conditioner than either lead walking or swimming, but it does teach the dog to pay attention to what all four feet are doing, and be agile in negotiating all kinds of unexpected obstacles (logs, roots, stone walls, etc.). These outings are usually enhanced if your dog can go with other dogs. You can use runs in the woods to practice recalls which are very useful in both agility and real life as well as sendaways, etc. Be creative. There are many things you can do outside, off lead that relate to agility.

Have fun and be safe

Most of us who do agility enjoy training our dogs. Remember when you engage in these conditioning exercises, or do agility, to practice moderation. Be vigilant about over-training, or pushing your dog further than he/she is ready to go. Signs of stress include excessive panting, and avoidant or apathetic behavior. If you are conditioning your dog for competition, a good rule of thumb is at least 4-5 workouts per week. These can include agility and/or obedience practice, but at least two or three of them should include exercise that conditions the muscles and lungs. Consistency is key, as well as creative integration of training modalities. You will find that you and your dog work more effectively as a team, injuries will be prevented, and your dog will have more zest and enthusiasm for all that you ask if the dog is in good condition!

Think Before She Leaps

Repetitive jumping from a truck or SUV may harm your dog's back.

"Load up!" cries out the patrolman. A black and tan streak of muscular German Shepherd Dog leaps from the ground and into the back of the department's SUV.

The site of a magnificent dog bounding easily to her work - or to join her owners on a road trip - fills any animal lover with admiration. However, some veterinarians suspect that leaping in and out of higher profile vehicles, such as pickup trucks and SUVs may result in painful and debilitating back conditions as dogs age.

You might not think twice when you ask your dog to leap into or exit the back of your high profile vehicle. But these particular leaps might do more damage than a simple jump over an object because of the steep angle of takeoff and landing. The angle can cause parts of the vertebrae to rub against each other. Over time, these minor injuries can add up.

If you have a big dog, be particularly diligent. "The old age, the bigger they are, the harder they fall is really true," says Christine Zink, DVM, Ph.D., who specializes in canine sports medicine and wrote *Peak Performance: Coaching the Canine Athlete* (Canine Sports Productions, 1998, \$24.95). "The larger dogs are going to suffer more from this kind of concussion."

When Mike Harrington, DVM a veterinary neurologist and American College of Veterinary Internal Medicine diplomat from Tacoma, Wash., addressed the Working K-9 Conference for Missing Person Cases in Moscow, Idaho, last year, he said, "I don't let my own German Shepherd, Riker, whom I am training for search and rescue, jump in and out of my pickup. I have trained him to use a ramp or to wait so that I can help lift him in and out."

Zink also takes precautions with her dogs. "I personally avoid having my dogs jump down from the back of my van," she says. "They are trained to step out and into my arms so that I can lower them more softly to the ground. I don't exactly lift them out. I just soften the landing."

Using a ramp or steps to allow easier access can also help prevent the jarring shock when your dog hits the pavement.

Conclusive evidence of these risks does not yet exist. However, looking at affected dogs makes concern reasonable.

In a study of close to 1,000 military dogs euthanized for various reason, spinal problems ranked third (after degenerative joint disease and neoplasia, a type of cancer) as the reason for euthanasia, according to a 2001 report in the *Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association*.

Although the study didn't specifically address high-profile vehicle entry and exit, that may be a part of the explanation for the high incidence of spinal problems in these dogs.

Zink believes protection of the spine should start early. Allowing a dog to leap full-height jumps or do weave poles prior to the closure of growth plates (10 months for smaller dogs, 14 months for large dogs) is a major contributing factor to spinal problems later in life, she says, "You should not ask your dog to jump higher than its carpus [wrist] before 6 months of age and no higher than elbow height before 14 months of age."

As with many diseases, spinal problems in dogs have more than one cause. Poor physical condition can contribute. Regular low-impact exercise helps keep a dog fit, says Rod Bagley, DVM, an ACVIM diplomate and veterinary neurologist at Washington State University College of Veterinary Medicine in Pullman. Maintaining a lean body weight helps, too, he says.


